UDHS Takes First in Ethics Bowl

For the first time in the history of Upper Darby High School...THE UPPER DARBY ETHICS TEAM WON THE DELAWARE VALLEY REGIONAL ETHICS BOWL!!!

As with last year's tournament, Upper Darby High School was in first place going into the playoffs of the Regional High School Ethics Bowl held at West Chester University. This year's team was undefeated in its first three rounds against Conestoga, Wilmington Friends, and Penn Charter, winning seven out of nine judges. In the quarter-finals, Upper Darby dominated Salesianum; in the semi-finals, Camden Catholic; and in the 6th and final round, faced off against powerhouse Cherry Hill East, winning the judges by a score of 154-147.

The UD Dream Team of Sabrina Gollotti (12), Delanie Jordan (12), Sylvia Langston (10), John Peter Quillen (12), and Chloe Thompson (10) have been preparing for the event since September and had a special chemistry and cohesiveness not seen in previous years. Words cannot adequately convey the scholarship, rigor, humility, and school spirit our students exhibited while competing against elite private and prep schools in our region. Their camaraderie, preparation, and respect for one another were second to none and their performance was nothing short of brilliant.

The annual Ethics Bowl is a competitive debate-style event that promotes ethical awareness, critical thinking, civil discourse, civic engagement, and an appreciation for multiple points of view. Although it is collaborative, the competition is rigorous and demanding. The fifteen case set included topics such as: vegan pet ownership, deciding which nations are deserving of hosting international sporting events, the ethics of tourism, social bonding with AI models, boycotting as a tool for activism, and the ethicality of voting third-party or choosing not to vote at all as a form of civil protest. Students researched the facts of the cases and studied the philosophies of Aristotle (Virtue Theory), Bentham (Utilitarianism), Kant (Deontology), and Hobbes (Rights-Based) to formulate and support their stances.

Says Coach Sue Beck, "Last year, Upper Darby finally had a seat at the table, but I stand corrected: Upper Darby High School is seated at the head of the table."

Engineering Students Visit Boeing

Bin Faruq--partnered with Boeing Helicopter in Ridley for a special program that allowed them to investigate many aspects of the manufacturing and aerospace industry. Boeing hosted the students from the Engineering II class for six workshops, which consisted of many tours of the Chinook and V-22 rotorcraft production lines, the composite manufacturing center, the wind tunnel, and other areas of facility, as well as workshops in assembly methods, modeling, and simulation. For the last 28 years, students enrolled in the engineering program have had the opportunity to participate in this same program, which requires them to develop their own product line and manufacturing facility. These students will present their "Factory of the Future" projects to parents, school administrators, and Boeing officials on Tuesday April 29.



Khandakar presented his paper "A Nietzschean Analysis of the Self-Overcoming of Claude Wheeler



as Übermensch" in Willa Cather's *One of Ours,* while Cierra delivered her work "Molding the Macho: An Analysis of Strength and Vulnerability in Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe."

Teacher's Take

Haley Keller Experiences Ramadan

This year I decided to try fasting for Ramadan in order to better understand the experience of my students. Leading up to my first week of fasting, I was honestly really nervous. When I thought about going a whole day (sunrise to sunset) without food or drink, I was not sure how I would be able to manage it. Truthfully, I could not manage it. My mood was down, my energy was nonexistent, and in the wake of spring sports beginning, I was the busiest I had been all year.

Needless to say, fasting did not last long for me because I found that in order to be the best possible support for my students and athletes, I would need to have a positive attitude and enough energy to continue to encourage them while they devoted themselves to their faith, which means I needed to eat. I stopped eating and drinking in front of my students and will continue this way until the end of Ramadan.

I spoke to one of my student athletes, Marian Konneh, who shared that she really loved seeing me try to fast. She said that she appreciated the intention to try and relate to students and their experience as the days during Ramadan are more difficult due to fasting and a disrupted sleep schedule. She said that the hardest part of Ramadan for her is that she has to convince herself that she is not hungry or thirsty, and it is even harder to see others eat while fasting.

I learned a lot about Ramadan from my students this year and I am so grateful for my students and athletes for answering my questions! While my fasting experience is done for this year, I might try it again next year!
